

THE MAIDEN OF FLORENCE **Katherine Mezzacappa**

Florence, 1584. Rumours are spreading about the virility of a prince marrying into the powerful Medici family. Orphan Giulia is chosen to put an end to the gossip. In return she will gain her freedom, and start a new life with a dowry and her own husband. Cloistered since childhood and an innocent in a world ruled by men, Giulia reluctantly agrees, only to be drawn under the control of the Medicis' lecherous minister.

Years later, married and with a growing family, Giulia hopes she has finally escaped the legacy of her past. But

when a threat arrives from a sinister figure from her youth, she must finally take control of events - and become the author of her own story.

Based on true events and reminiscent of The Marriage Portrait by Maggie O'Farrell, The Maiden of Florence gives a charismatic voice to a woman cast aside by history.

My defloration was talked about in all the courts of Europe. [...] Those events are almost thirty years old, but I remember them as if they happened thirty days ago, though I have tried to bury the memories. *Nearly every player in that story is dead.* It is only now that what happened can be told by me, not by the men - and woman who decided my fate.






THE MOON AND STARS Jenna Warren



In February 1959, Switzerland held a referendum on women's suffrage. The men voted 'no'.


In this powerful novella, Clare O'Dea explores that day through the eyes of four very different Swiss women. Vreni is a busy farmer's wife, longing for a break from family life. Her grown-up daughter Margrit is carving out an independent life in Bern, but finds herself trapped in an alarming situation. Esther, a cleaner, is desperate to recover her son who has been taken into care. Beatrice, a hospital administrator, has been throwing herself into the 'yes' campaign. The four women's paths intersect on a day that will leave its mark on all their lives.

Douglas Bruton is the author of five previous novels: The Chess Piece Magician (2009), Mrs Winchester's Gun Club (2019), Blue Postcards (2021), With or Without Angels (2022) and Hope Never Knew Horizon (2024). His short fiction has appeared in various publications including Northwords Now, New Writing Scotland, Aesthetica, The Fiction Desk and the Irish Literary Review, and has won competitions including Fish and the Neil Gunn Prize.

Born in Edinburgh, Douglas spent most of his working life as an English and guidance teacher. Now retired, Douglas continues to reside in Scotland where he writes in his spare time.

BLUE POSTCARDS Douglas Bruton


Once there was a street in Paris and it was called the Street of Tailors. This was years back, in the blue mists of memory.


WITH OR WITHOUT ANGELS Douglas Bruton

The thought in my head does not yet have shape or form, only direction, one picture leading into another.


An ageing artist, faced with his own mortality, embarks on one final artwork. As he battles to complete the project, working with an enigmatic young photographer, he finds his past and present blurring. Through the act of creation and the memories it excavates, the artist comes to a realisation about what matters most, and what he will leave behind when he is gone. This hybrid and innovative short novel responds through fiction to *The New World*, the final artwork by the late artist Alan Smith – which is in turn a response to an eighteenth-century fresco, Giandomenico Tiepolo's *Il Mondo Nuovo*. With sparkling, dreamlike prose, Bruton weaves a story around these artworks, arriving at both a profound exploration of the creative process and a timeless love story told in a new way.



Alan Robert Clark was born and educated in Scotland. He briefly attended King's College London, before opting instead for a career as a copywriter and creative director with a number of leading advertising agencies. He has also worked as a freelance journalist, and has ghost-written and coauthored a number of biographies. He is the author of three previous novels, *Rory's Boys* (2011), *The Prince of Mirrors* (2018), *Valhalla* (2020), and *The Redemption of Isobel Farrar* (2023).


One predicted to succeed, the other to fail...

Arthur, an older man who loves and protects him. But something is still missing from Frank's life.


